Literary Research Paper

As noted in your syllabus, this course centers on one major project, a **documented research paper on a literary topic**, and on the writing and speaking processes that precede and follow the paper itself. Your grades in the course will be weighted as follows:

- **Participation** in the Research Process (see objectives A, B, and C under "Scope" on syllabus) will determine **30%** of your grade in the course.
- The **research paper** itself will determine 40% of your grade in the course.
- The **oral presentation** of your work will determine **10%** of your grade in the course.
- The **final examination**, an essay assessing your entire research process and the oral presentations of three peers, will determine **20%** of your grade in the course.

Topics

Please choose **one** of the following topics for your research project:

- 1. If you are taking my course in Twentieth-Century American literature, you can write on Arthur Miller's play Death of a Salesman. You may write on the same topic that you wrote on for that class, but your new paper must show significant revision and expansion; it must also incorporate the views of at least three secondary sources, which usually take the form of an article from a scholarly journal or a chapter from a scholarly book that relates to your topic. Alternatively, you may write on a different topic on Death of a Salesman. In other words, you may have written your paper for the American Literature course on Willy as a tragic character; your new paper may focus instead on Linda or on one of the other topics. Whatever your topic on Salesman, you may use three of the sources (articles) that I will make available to you, or you may find alternative sources on your own; you may also use a combination of my sources and sources you find independently.
- 2. If you are taking my Twentieth-Century American literature course, you may also write on **Ernest Gaines' novel** *A Lesson before Dying*. Again, you may revise and expand your paper for Twentieth-Century American Literature, or you may write on a topic you did not take up before. I will provide you three articles on Gaines' novel; you may use them as your three secondary sources, you may find your own sources, or you may combine my sources with some of your own. In any case, **you must blend the views of three scholars with your own analysis**.
- 3. If you do not want to do research on *Death of a Salesman* or on *A Lesson before Dying*, you may explore instead the **Balkans conflict as portrayed in history and fiction**. Your work will focus on **one** of the books from **each** of the lists that follow:

I own all of these books; you may borrow your two volumes from me if you cannot find your own. Your paper **must also include the views of three scholars** whose work you found in articles or book chapters.

4. **Devise your own topic.** You may do your research paper on **any work of literature** which you have read on your own or have studied in some other class, or **on a linguistics topic, such as ways to facilitate second-language acquisition**. However, **I expect original work**: You may not submit to me a paper you have already written for another class. Again, your paper must include the views of at least three scholars whose work you found in articles or books.

Specifications and Procedures

- Your research paper should reach approximately **10 pages**, double-spaced, 12-point type (2,500 words). Additionally, your research paper should include a **Works Cited page**(s), listing alphabetically your primary source(s) and your three secondary sources in the format prescribed by the Modern Language Association. See model distributed in class.
- You will prepare a **research proposal** and **two preliminary drafts** of the paper. Only the final (third) draft will receive a grade, but you will fail the course if you do not submit the rough draft and the first revision.
- You must attend **three conferences** with me to talk about your progress on the project. See syllabus.
- You will **submit your final draft at the end of the eleventh week** of class.
- The next three weeks will be devoted to **10-15 minute oral presentations** of your research, stressing your conclusions and your key evidence. All students must attend every presentation.
- The **final examination** will give you a chance to reflect on the entire research process and to assess the oral presentations of three of your fellow students.
- Any type of **academic dishonesty**—submitting a paper written for another course, failing to quote secondary sources, submitting someone else's paper—will yield a failing grade in the course.
